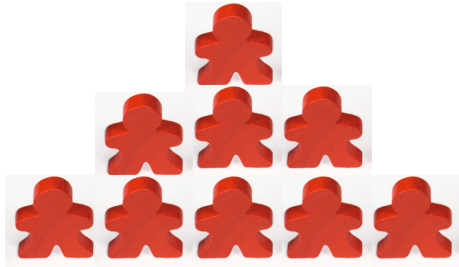

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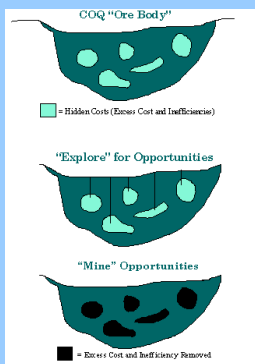
(COQ) COST OF QUALITY

ANTI BOLTING DEVICE

Gobinda Chandra Gogoi hails from Rajgarh in Assam. He is 68 years old. He worked for Govt. of Assam till his retirement in 1996. He was also running a small printing press in his wife's name till 2000. Gogoi developed the idea of the L-drop auto protector in the year 2000, after reading about a reported case at Guwahati, where burglars locked inmates within a room (having L-drop) from outside, while ransacking the house. To overcome this problem he thought of designing an anti-locking device to prevent unauthorized locking of the door from outside when a person is already present in the room and vice-versa. This was all the more important as there was no two-way anti-locking device available in the market. Gogoi has solved a problem that many households face either due to pranks by children or as a safety hazard. Sometimes when people are inside a house the latch is bolted from outside and the inmates have to call somebody to open it from outside. With the device developed by Gobinda such will never be the case. At present the device has been fitted in four houses and has been found to be eminently useful. This low cost device prevents the door being locked from outside or from inside depending upon the user's wish.

WATER EVERYWHERE, NOT A DROP TO DRINK

PERENNIAL WATER crisis in Gujarat notwithstanding no one has ever bothered to give a serious thought as to how and why the problem is perpetual. Not only the parched state indulges in all sorts of water-intensive industries like chemical, pharmaceutical, dyeing and it also grows cash crops, requiring a lot of water. The Government, on its part, has failed to prevent excessive use of ground water resources.

The National Water Policy, formulated in 1988 after Gujarat had experienced drought for three consecutive years, clearly stipulates that the order of priority for water use should be first for drinking, followed by irrigation and the last should be for industry.

But, the various state governments, irrespective of their ideologies, have flouted the regulation. Decision to lower the price of water for industrial use from Rs 6.50 per thousand litres to Rs 3.25 at a time when more than 12,000 villages have been declared as scarcity hit, is the latest instance.



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
